Listeners don't hang on to every word they hear on the radio, but by adding an extra layer like in this promo, there's a greater chance of the listener grasping what it's all about.

It's all shiny and new... well, it's starting to be. The new computers are slowly being rolled out and chances are many of you have already used the couple that have been used for initial testing. Apart



from a couple of minor issues, it all seems to be working fine. At least no-one has really said anything and there hasn't been any fault reports, so I assume it's all good.

You can expect the new PCs to start showing up more and more over the next couple of weeks. The final big test will be in Studio 3, to check full working operation with the desk and Dinesat.

Speaking of Dinesat, you should expect to see a newer version of that as well. While it doesn't have everything changed that we wanted, one of the major changes is in how Dinesat imports and lists MP3 files. This has been what we have waited for in order to initiate an on-line CD library.

So we can now test this feature more fully with a view to starting to have a CD library playable on-air in early 2008.
